सुखार्थिनः कुतो विद्याना स्ति विद्यार्थिनः सुखम्। सुखार्थी वात्यजे त्विद्यां विद्यार्थी व त्यजेत् सुखम्॥

अर्थात : सुख की इच्छा रखने वाले को विद्या की प्राप्ति नहीं हो सकती है । विद्या की इच्छा रखने वाले को सुख नहीं मिल सकता है । अतः सुख की कामना करने वाले को विद्या का त्याग कर देना चाहिये तथा विद्या की प्राप्ति के लिये सुख का परित्याग कर देना चाहिये ।
